As the number of Covid-19 cases declined, more people felt comfortable bringing their pets to the HHS Veterinary Clinic for annual exams, vaccines, and spay/neuter surgeries. Thanks to your loyal support, we came through the pandemic years stronger than ever.

HHS's successes can be attributed to an exceptionally dedicated team of employees, including some who have been part of our organization for more than 20 years. We are also immensely grateful to our volunteers who devoted **26,844 hours** to enhance the well-being of animals under our care and to support our shelter, clinic, and wildlife programs.

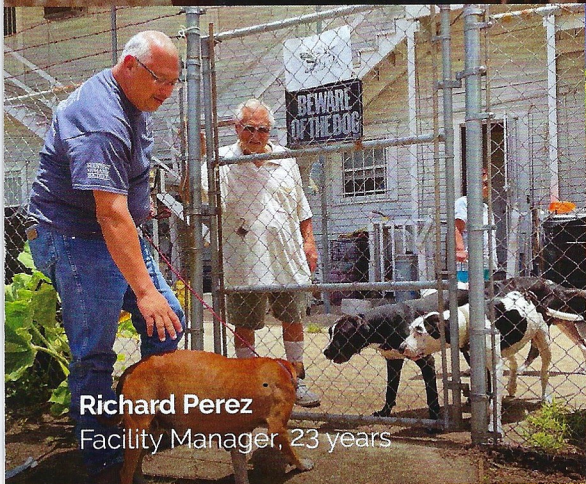

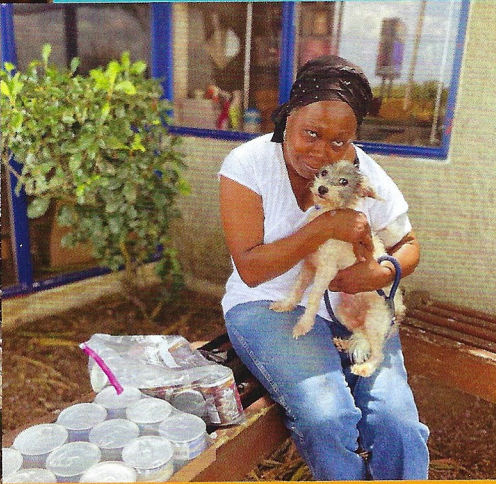
Last year, we cared for **70,438 animals** including cats, dogs, fowl, goats, horses, pigs, rabbits, rodents, snakes, turtles, domestic and wild birds, geckos, and one large iguana!

We took in **729 at-risk animals** from nearby shelters who needed specialized medical or behavioral care, including animals who were sick, injured, seniors, orphaned by their mother, or experiencing minor behavioral challenges.

HHS foster parents opened their hearts and homes to **963 animals** in need, helping them to heal and prepare for adoption.



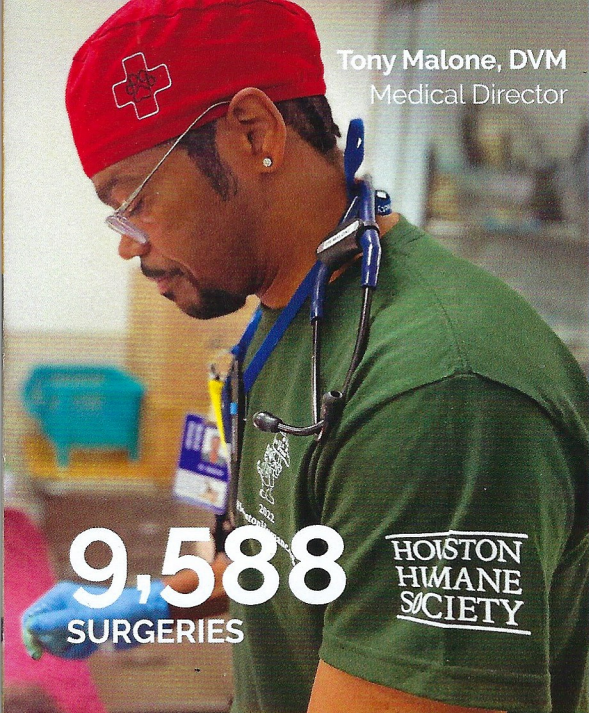

In addition to continuing our mobile Pet Pantry program at sites throughout the greater Houston area, we initiated a Monthly Assistance program to help individuals needing temporary assistance to keep their pets at home and off the streets. We also continued our partnership with fellow community-serving organizations and elected officials to ensure our services were available to those who needed it most. Our partnership with DoorDash enabled us to deliver pet food to individuals who are homebound, and we also provided those in need with mobile veterinary care services. With the help of community partners, we distributed **973,981 meals** to help feed **28,126 pets**.



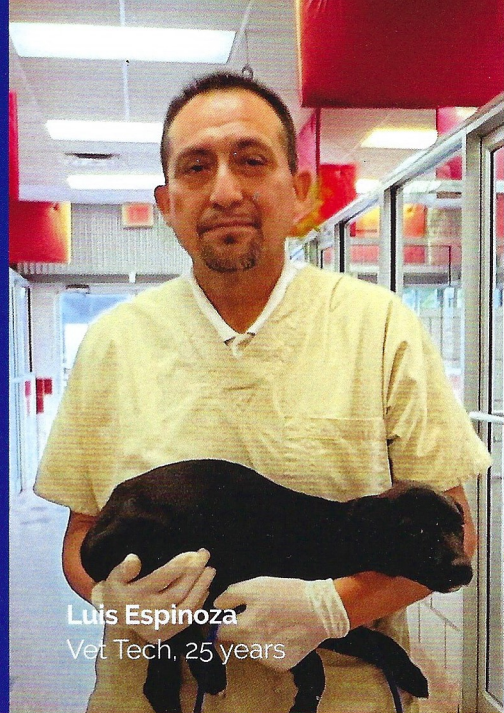

Our Veterinary Clinic served **38,326 pets**. The team performed **9,588 surgeries**, administered **46,692 vaccines**, cared for **614 cruelty rescues**, and maintained contact with families whose pets they see on an ongoing basis. They worked closely with the shelter team making sure that **2,858 animals** were ready for new forever homes.

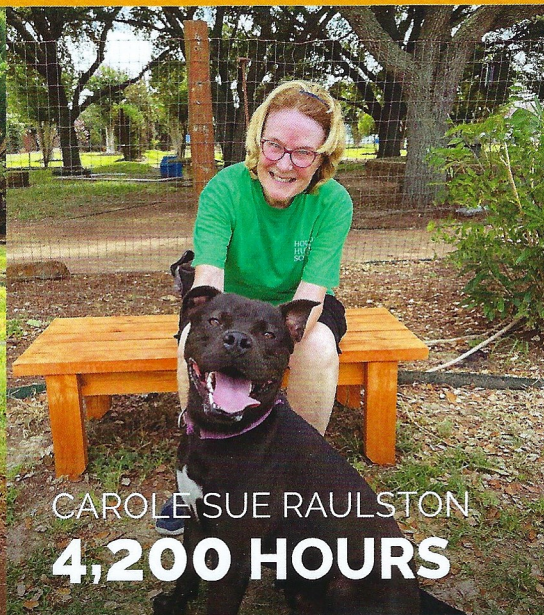

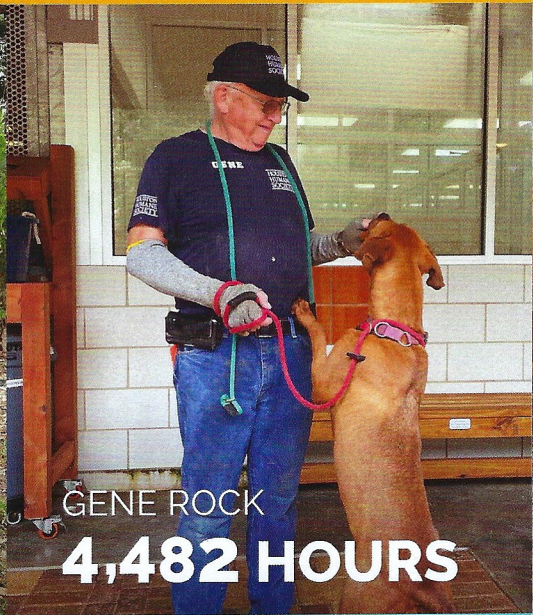

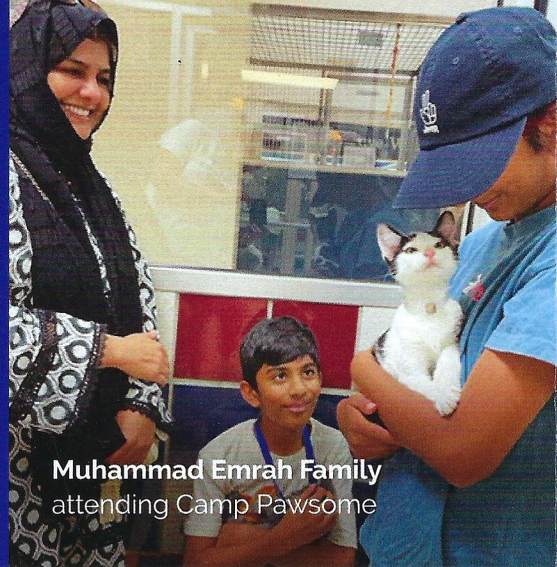

Last year, Texas Wildlife Rehabilitation Center joined HHS and became HHS Wildlife Center. Our two organizations coming together as one is a sign of our shared commitment to the well-being of all animals – cats, dogs, small mammals, livestock, reptiles, pet birds, and wildlife – and to educating our community on the important role they play in our lives. HHS Wildlife Center served a total of **3,114 animals**, including rescuing and rehabilitating **1,763 bats** during the December winter freeze.



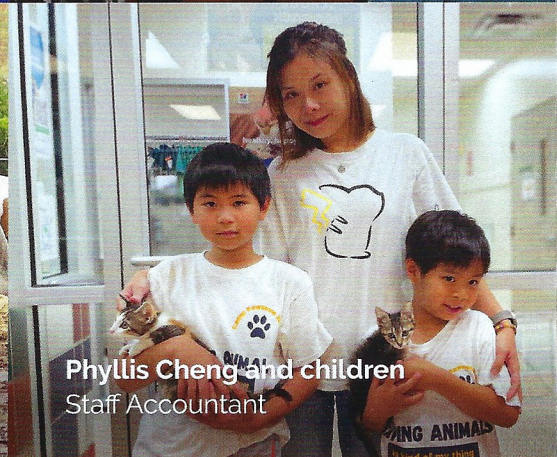

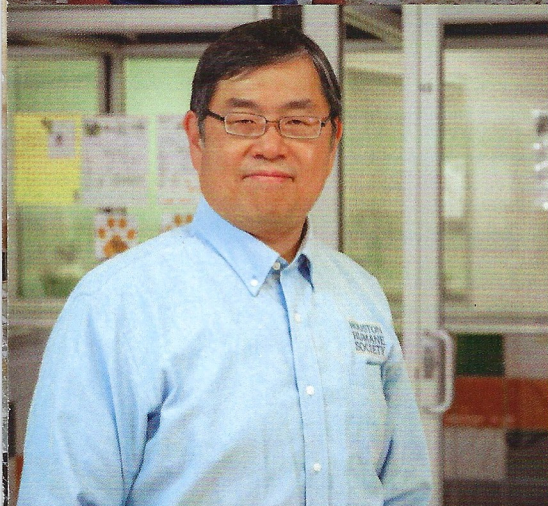

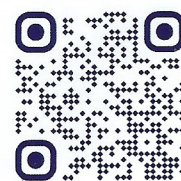
